An Invitation to the Holy Observance of Lent ASH WEDNESDAY

Wednesday, February 14th

From the early days of our faith, Christians have observed the remembrance of Christ's passion and resurrection with great reverence. It became the custom to prepare for that observance by a season of prayer and fasting, and the reconciliation of those who had been separated from the community of faith.

By keeping the season of Lent, we take to heart God's call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel, and practice in our daily lives the work of reconciliation.

I invite you, therefore, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the season of Lent. Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us to realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship. Historically, ashes signified purification and sorrow for sins.

We will hold our Ash Wednesday Service at 7:00PM in the sanctuary.

Note: There will be NO W.O.W. "Wonderful on Wednesday" Night Dinner on Ash Wednesday. Dinner's will resume on the following Wednesday, February 21st.

Make Worship a Holy Habit! Why not "take on" "Perfect attendance" in Worship for the Seven Sundays of Lent as a witness of your "Works of Piety" during this Special Season of Love? I will be preaching a sermon series entitled, Love On The Cross.

Givin' it up...or takin' it on

I have to admit that when I was asked last week, "Rev. Tracy, what are you giving up for Lent?," I was taken aback. It had been a long time since I had actually verbalized what I was going to "give up" for Lent. Further, I do not remember a time when anyone has ever inquired of me, "What are you taking on for Lent?"

Some years ago, there was a popular beer commercial that begged the question, "Tastes great?" or "Less filling?" It was settled by choice. One option was not better than the other. It was simply choice.

And, this is the question of Lent. Tradition in the church has stressed that Lent is a season of selfdenial. In this vein, one would (sacrificially) give something up for the forty days of the season, excluding the feast days (Sundays). The key to this concept is the word "sacrificial." In other words, "Don't give up spinach, if you don't like spinach..." There are a variety of things that a person can give up during the days of Lent. Many of these are food/diet related: chocolate, sweets, caffeine, and Facebook, for example. There are also behavioral things that a person can give up for Lent: gossip, procrastination, uncontrolled anger, co-dependencies, or tardiness, for example.

For many people, this concept is a good, holy practice. I know that those times that I have given up something of great, personal pleasure, I have been blessed by the end of the season. This blessing comes not only from the satisfaction of the success of enduring the sacrifice but, from a sense of peace about "doing without" some of the excess of my lifestyle.

On the other hand, there is also within the tradition in the church the idea that Lent is a time to take some additional "burden" on. As Christ walks to Calvary bearing our sin, we, too, can share the walk by "taking on" something for


others. The key to this concept is the word "burden." It, like "sacrifice," must live up to the weight (pun intended) of the concept. This could be something like "taking on" visiting the elderly or the sick. This could be something like "taking on" an additional financial contribution to the church. This could be something like "taking on" helping in a project at a place like Family Promise, Warmth For the Winter, The Rainbow Child Care Mission or one of our new mission initiatives, helping in the Giving Hope Retreat in Lacombe. I once knew of a woman's group that "took on" the idea of "making someone happy every day in Lent." Each woman would then make 40 people happy. And, they added an accountability factor: one is supposed to journal how, what and whom they made happy during this Lenten period. At the end of Lent, they shared how this practice changed their lives. Another friend once set a goal of "hugging" (a practice that was not particularly easy for this person) six (6)people a day.

For many people, this too, is a concept that is a good and holy practice. There are blessings to be found by stretching one's self and "taking on" something for others. Again, the blessing not only comes from the accomplishment...rather, the accomplishment brings the blessing of joy, self-giving, and strength to name a few. So, what are we to do for Lent? Give something up? Take something on?

Like that old commercial, it really is a matter of choice. Here is my advice: First, pray about your life and what might make your "Christ Walk" stronger. Then, do something. You may give something up. You may take something on. Or, you may want to do both. Be creative. Challenge yourself. Rest assured, following a Lenten disciple of prayer, self-denial, and love, you will receive....


"I have never met a person whose goal was to ruin his or her life.
